

## **SOMBRERO DE CHASNA**

It is a simple climb, with fantastic views, both of Teide and the immensity of Llano de Ucanca, as well as the entire southwestern part of the island, and the blue sea.





The Sombrerito de Chasna is located at 2,435 meters of altitude, being one of the most striking peaks in the south of Tenerife. Its rocky wall rises like a hat from the slopes of the Caldera of the Teide National Park. During the ascent to the wide plateau of the summit, after a considerable final slope, you will enjoy magnificent views of Teide and Las Cañadas. The trail begins at the curve to the right of the TF-21 general highway, from Vilaflor to Las Cañadas, at kilometer 59.7. At the entrance to the path there are two stone houses in ruins and an information sign about the path.



From there begins a progressive and winding ascent toward the Sombrero de Chasna. It passes through an area of not very dense pine forest, until reaching 2,200 m. in which the broomcodesar predominates.

From the top, if the weather conditions permit, excellent panoramic views of both Teide and Llano de Ucanca as well as Vilaflor and a large part of the southern coast of the island are contemplated.

In this area, a white-flowered species of broom (Spartocytisus supranubius) predominate with the very occasional presence of pine (Pinus canariensis) and cedar (Juniperus cedrus) specimens.
